As part of our process and meetings, we approved our Annual implementation Plan -A.I.P. on Tuesday night. This document will be uploaded to the website by the end of next week. We are also in a year of review - referred to as our Strategic Review.

Over the last four years our Vision has been to work with our community to provide innovative learning that encourages excellence, strengthens self-belief, supports deep creative thinking, recognizes diversity, develops compassion, respects the environment and gives all students the choices to fully participate in a sustainable global future. PERSONAL GOODS BROUGHT TO SCHOOL AT OWNER'S RISK

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development does not hold insurance for personal property brought to schools. Principals are requested to remind students and parents/guardians of this at the beginning of each academic year and to discourage parents/students from bringing any unnecessary or particularly valuable items to school. Please, try and avoid bringing these items as it can be most upsetting for all concerned when items do go missing.

If a student needs to bring a mobile phone to school, students are to leave mobile phones either with their class teachers or at the office, prior to classes commencing and collect them at the end of the day.

ACCIDENT INSURANCE

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development does not provide personal accident insurance for students. Parents are generally responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including any transport costs. Ambulance cover could be one consideration as the school will not hesitate to call an ambulance if we are concerned for a child's wellbeing.

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development states that reasonable low cost accident insurance policies are available from the commercial insurance sector. Special Monitor Assembly

How wonderful it was to observe our senior students receive their certificates and badges for taking on roles of responsibility in our school. Newly elected Yarra Ranges Council Mayor Richard Higgins, joined us to congratulate and acknowledge our students for their readiness to develop their leadership skills and share their passions and interests with the broader community.

All positions required students to write a letter describing why they should be considered for the role they selected. **Here are some samples** of the excerpts shared at our special assembly:

Josh (Tour Guide): "I would like to be a tour guide. The first reason is due to my bubbly and energetic personality. I could and would serve as a friendly reminder of what our school encourages. I could give exciting tours in and out of classrooms. Seeing the work that goes on inside would convince the parents to take their children here. No questions would be left unanswered; introducing staff on the way."

Dash (Kindness Matters Team): "I know that you have your hands full with Kindness Matters and you have filled all the spaces for new recruits like me, but I am sure that even though you've used all the spaces you could still use an extra pair of hands and I am indeed kind, and have hands. I think I could be a superb addition to Kindness Matters".

Ruben (Gang Green Team): "I would be a good Gang Green Monitor because I have learnt a lot about planting and taking care of the garden. After doing it, it made me excited and positive about the day. Next year I would like to help with getting our school garden looking good. Behind the art room is an area that we could"

Milla (Art Monitor): "I would like to be an Art Monitor because I love helping Sofia in the art room and I have done it most of my school life......"

Robbie (IT Monitor): "I think I would be a good IT monitor. I have always wanted to be an IT monitor and I have helped untangle charging cords many times. ... I could also do virus scans and help people who are having trouble on computers".

Josie (Weather Monitor): I think I am worthy of this monitor role because I study a lot of non-fiction, such as the weather. I am also very good at taking notes in notebooks. In this case, weather"

Leni (Assembly Monitor): I would like to be a set us Assembly Monitor because of my love of setting things up and getting things in their rightful place. I think I would be a good choice because I can get everything done in about five or ten minutes".

Another important role celebrated at the monitor assembly is the SRC (Student Representative Council). Two students from each class from Year 3-6 have been selected either by teachers in the 3/4 area, or voted by their classmates 5/6 area.

To ensure students were not voted on personalities, year 5/6 wrote an application that identified what they would bring to the SRC if they were elected and students voted on the ideas rather than the student (no names were given with the ideas). Here is what Beau wrote to her class (no surprise that she was voted as their rep!):

Dear 5/6A,

I am writing this letter to apply for the position as one of your SRC representatives. Here are a few of the reasons why I think I would be good at SRC.

Firstly, I would like to set up a range of additional activities to do at play, including sports and crafts, if you don't have anyone to play with and you don't want to go to the buddy bench. Secondly, I want to make everyone feel like their ideas matter so I would listen to anyone who want to share ideas and take them forward to discuss at the SRC meetings. Thirdly, I believe myself to be trustworthy and organised and will promise to act with respect, responsibility and integrity to uphold our school values. In conclusion, I believe I would make a good SRC representative and hope that you vote for me so school will be a happier and brighter place."

We are proud of our senior students and their confidence and readiness to be the agents of change in their school. This is what student voice and agency looks like and we intend to extend it even further and deeper to ensure all students have a voice and a call to action.

Bookings
Vacation Care bookings must be paid for prior to the commencement of Vacation Care. This is done via IP. If the requested dates on the Vacation Care booking form (on Council's website) are available, these will be the dates that families will be booked in and charged for.

Late pick up fee The Vacation Care prog

The Vacation Care program finishes each day at 6pm. If a child is not picked up by this time a late fee will be charged, according to the following scale - \$10 for every 10 minutes or part thereof per family.

Cancellations

No refunds or credits given for days that families have booked and no longer require. Payment is required for all booked days whether children attend the program or not.

Children's belongings
Strictly no money or children's toys (including iPods, phones, DS consoles, cameras) are to be brought to the program.

Please clearly label all your child's clothing and belongings.

Priority of access

Priority of access
The Australian Government regards children at risk of abuse or neglect as a priority group for access to quality childcare. Families in crisis should also have support and assistance from child care services to the maximum extent possible. The Australian Government resources child care with a major purpose of meeting the child care needs of families with recognised work or work related commitments. Where demand for care exceeds supply, it is important for services to allocate available places to those families with the greatest need for childcare support.

 Children must be dressed in clothing appropriate for the weather. In wetter months, please bring a waterproof coat, bearie, umbrella and gum boots. In warmer months, please dress children in 'Sun smart' clothing, including covered shoulders. Please make sur your child wears appropriate shoes for playing. No thongs or flip-flops. Please label colthing and personal belongings with your child's name so that it can be easily identified.

Food and drinks

 Parents are required to provide nutritious lunches
 and snacks, such as sandwiches, fruit, cheese
 sticks, and water. Please send pienty of food for
 your child to eat.
 Please send a refillable drink bottle with water
 every day.

- Please no cans/bottles of soft drink.
 Please note that we cannot heat or cook children's snacks or lunches.
 Marry excursions do not allow us to take wrappers, we strongly encourage families to re-think your child's lunch box and send nude food each day to the program.

Excursions

- Coursions
 Children must arrive at the program at least 30 minutes before the stated departure time this will help us to avoid being late for booked activities. The bus will not waif for those who are late. If your child will not be attending on an excursion day, please contact the Educators at the program before 8.30am to prevent delays in departure.
 Please dress appropriately as excursions will run during all westher conditions.
 Children are not to bring money on excursions. All buses are fitted with seat belts. Educator/telin ratio is: 1 deucator to every 8 children and for a swimming excursion 1 educator to every 6 children.
 Please make sure your child brings a refiliable water bottle and plenty of food to eat with no wrappers.

- Medication

 If a child is to receive medication during the day, parents must complete the Medication Instruction Sheet, and sign the medication in and out with an educator each day.

 Medication must be in the original containers with the original labels and the child's name and specific dosage must be clearly visible on the containers. This also applies to any over the counter medication.


