PARENT ISSUES:

I would like to reiterate once again, the importance of raising issues amongst children to the school so we can deal with them. On occasions, parents have liked to 'take matters into their own hands' and speak with other parents, or other children, about things that happen at school. Please note we do not recommend parents question/talk with/reprimand students, other than their own or without specific permission (from the other parent) to do so. If parents require information regarding an incident at school they should, in the first instance, speak with the relevant teacher and then, if needed, with the school leadership. It is much easier for us to investigate incidents and contact the people concerned. It is also less of an emotional encounter. Parents speaking to other parents or other children often inflames the situation.

MAKING YOUR CHILD'S ONLINE EXPERIENCE SAFE

There has been lots of information in regards to online gaming, bullying and cyber safety lately, below is information that may be of assistance to your family. I have also attached an article from eSmart on FORTNITE.

There are many types of social media and the examples are just a few of the many:

- Messaging (kik, snapchat, whats app (linked to facebook), viber, sms, ask fm,
- Social networking : Instagram, musically, facebook, youtube, tumblr, twitter, live.ly,
- Games and gaming world: clash of clans, minecraft, fortnite, league of legends,
- Secret/hidden and dating apps: tinder, ky-calc, bumble

In setting up to make a safer environment for our children at home:

1. Create an acceptable use agreement for your families to facilitate conversation. Ensure that all children are involved in the process.
2. Set up safe search and security controls with a platform such as Family Zone www.familyzone.com/au/
3. Agree on where computers, laptops and mobile devices can be used in the home (such as in bedrooms, lounge rooms etc)
4. Lights out = wifi off
5. Agree on screentime use; decide on screen free times during the day and night. Have regular family activities that don't involve devices
6. Get involved, show an interest in what your child is doing online
7. Talk to your child's teacher and/or school
8. If you child reports an issue to you, don't threaten to take away their device, this may lead to them becoming more secretive
9. Learn how the various social network/game services work. Use websites such as the "Games, Apps and Social Networking" from the safety office
10. If cyber bullied, 1. Don't retaliate, 2. Collect evidence 3. Report 4. Change privacy settings 5. Block and 6. Tell a trusted adult.

What is available to our students can be quiet scary and we need to be informed about what is actually out there, I feel a key rule is where the devices are and at what times children are on them.

Many of the sites require the children to be 13 and many parents give access to these sites earlier than recommended. Most of the issues we deal with are from sites that the children should not be on, the parents aren't aware of the times, many around midnight/1am and on sites the parents were not aware their children is on.

SOCIAL SKILLS FOR CHILDREN

School brings different types of learning, including social interactions and how to make friends. Parents can lay the foundations at home by teaching their kids these seven important social skills.

Children who are able to form friendships when they start school are happier at school and also learn better. More significantly, positive friendships have long-term implications for social and indirectly academic success.

Friendships skills are generally developmental, but they don't develop in isolation. Children acquire these skills when they play with their siblings and interact with children and adults outside their family. Today's children grow up with fewer siblings, fewer opportunities for unstructured play and less freedom to explore friendships than children of even ten years ago.

Parents can help kids develop important social competencies by teaching them sociable behaviors at home, providing opportunities for kids to play with each other in a variety of situations.

Parents can also model behaviours in how you interact with others, both in person but also increasingly online on sites such as Facebook. What the kids see is what they may adopt so always remember, little eyes and ears may be watching!

Here are seven important social skills to help children to develop:

1. Ask for what you want

Help children ask for what they want. It means they don't throw tantrums, whinge, and sulk or expect parents to guess what's on their minds. While we need to be patient with toddlers, we need also to give older children the chance and opportunity to ask for what they want. Sometimes we need to ignore shrugs and grunts and expect them to articulate their wishes. This is the basis of civil behaviour, as well as a basic human skill.

2. Good manners

Teach kids good manners, in particular the three 'power words'. These words are very persuasive because they have a way of breaking down barriers and people's defences. These three words are: your name; please; thanks. These terms are the basis of good manners and when used, will increase the likelihood of getting what you want.

3. Sharing

Sharing is a basic social skill. Developmentally, very young children like to keep their possessions themselves. As they get older and move into Pre School and beyond the notion of sharing becomes a pre-requisite for playing with and forming relationships with others. Other children like to play and be with those who share their time, possessions and space with them. Sharing is the start of empathy as it shows sensitivity to other people's feelings.

4. Holding a conversation

Holding conversations with others is a lifetime friendship skill. Conversations require self-disclosure, which can be challenging for some children. Good conversationalists give of themselves, but also take an interest in the person they are talking to. Many children forget that good conversations are two-way events, and tend to focus solely on themselves.

Children within conversations need to learn to ask good or interesting questions; to take turns when speaking and to show you are listening by making eye contact and not interrupting.

5. Winning and losing well

Kids need to learn to win without rubbing others noses in it, and lose gracefully without throwing tantrums and making excuses. Wanting to win is natural, but they need to do so in a way that they maintain a relationship with other players so they will play again. Losing may make kids feel bad, but kids need to control their negative feelings so that others will play with them again.

6. Approaching and joining a group

The ability to approach strangers in social situations is a valuable skill that opens up many doors, both friendship-wise and business-wise. These skills can be learned and practised during childhood, so that it becomes second nature in adulthood.

7. Handling fights and disagreements

Disagreements happen in families and among friends. The key is to make sure disagreements don't lead to the breakdown of friendships. It's important to get across to kids that having an argument or disagreement doesn't mean that a friendship is over. Strong friendships, like strong family relationships, withstand disagreements. In fact, they only serve to strengthen friendships.

The results of a number of studies indicate that children can be taught friendships skills. The strategies are simple and revolve around teaching children a range of friendly behaviours such as: talking with others while playing, showing an interest in others, smiling, offering help and encouragement when needed, a willingness to share and learning how to enter a game or social situation.

As parents we often focus on the development of children's academic skills and quite easily neglect the development of important social skills, which contribute so much to children's happiness and wellbeing.

Our Upcoming Festival

Our **whole school fundraiser** is getting closer and excitement is beginning to build up. Preparations are well underway to ensure the day (and evening) is a resounding success and is the beginning of a wonderful biennial school tradition.

Performers:

There will be **three musical stages** operating throughout the event and **all students are scheduled to perform** a musical piece on the “Garden Stage” during the day:

The “Main Stage” will be situated on the school oval towards the back boundary. Bands performing on this stage include **Banbury Cross, Spiritus, Pen Swales, The Bean Project, The Skylarks, and Lost Canoe.**

There will also be a stage on the basketball courts at the eastern (5/6 classroom) corner and performers scheduled to play here include **Sadie Mustoe, Blackwood Trio, Kalulu, Eddie Cole, Jam Tarts Trio, and the Mater Christi Rock Band.**

Programs will be for sale on the day for \$2 to ensure you don't miss your favourite acts and all stages have managers to ensure the performances run seamlessly.

Food:

All food sold at the festival will be prepared, cooked and sold by volunteer parents and will provide much of the fundraising profits for our school. Food will be available on the basketball courts from 2 – 8pm and there will be ample seating to enjoy your purchases. Stalls include:

- **Pulled pork**, crackling and coleslaw sliders
- **Soft shell tacos**
- **Vegan hot dogs**
- **Cheese toasties and chicken nuggets**
- **Sausages** in bread, **hamburgers**
- **Cake stall** (donated cakes and slices from parents; sold by year 5/6 students) – until sold out
- **Devonshire Tea** – this will be served in our Library Café from 2-5pm
- **Wood-Fired Pizza** will also be for sale at the pizza oven

There will also be a **Beer and Wine Tent** and a beautiful **Chai Tent** on the oval as well as the famous “**Oscar's Coffee Cart**” to lend a vintage look to the festival.

Customers will have the option of paying for items by eftpos or with cash.

Market Stalls and Class Activities:

There will be a variety of market stalls selling a range of products including homemade, upcycled, and handcrafted items on the oval. There will also be stalls run by each class/year level including:

- Preps: Mini Terrariums and Photo Booth (activities, gold coin)
- Year 1: Felt craft (items for sale made by year 1)
- Year 2: Painted rocks (activity, gold coin)
- Year 3/4: Wurundjeri Trail Tours; Sponge Pool (throw a wet sponge at your favourite teacher!); Opportunity shop; Homemade musical instruments (activities; gold coin)
- Year 5/6: Cake Stall (fixed prices); Sandwich Wraps (proceeds to Year 6 Graduation); Class Activity Stalls (TBC)

It is hoped that families will be able to donate an hour at some stage through the day/evening to help sell, cook, or prepare food or drinks, or to supervise parking, first aid, put up marquees or decorations, or count money. As this is our major school fundraiser with funds going towards literacy resources, corrective reading programs and other school equipment, we wish to maximise our profits as much as possible.




