SPECIAL MONITOR ASSEMBLY JUNE 28

On the last day of term 2, we held our special Monitor's Assembly where we acknowledged the good work of our monitors and 5/6 leaders of Semester 1 and welcomed in the new monitors and leaders for Semester 2.

Yarra Ranges Council Mayor Stevenson came along to present our students with certificates, badges and to shake their hand and we were able to see the broad range of responsibilities our students have volunteered to accept as part of the school leadership program. Mayor Stevenson suggested our monitor roles replicated a town with its focus on resource management, communications, well-being, the arts, emergency management, facilities and participation.

Year 3/4 have also been involved this year and a team of students have taken on the responsibility of ensuring our waste is correctly managed. They collect paper products for recycling, take our mixed recycling (with adult supervision) to the top of the school for council collection, and ensure our bins are not contaminated. Year 6 student, Hamish E-B, continues to implement his collection of soft plastics to complete the waste management loop in our school.

We also have students providing a weekly weather report at assembly. This requires research and preparation, and aims to reduce our school energy use.

Assembly and Photography monitors ensure our regular Friday assemblies are set up and special items are captured on film for our newsletter. Our chickens have monitors as do our art and music program to help wherever they are needed. We have students who are responsible for assisting with the sports program, act as fire wardens, and ensure our ICT equipment is working efficiently.

We also have teams of students who take parent tours around the school, participant in the Kindness Matters group, assist with the Kinder Program or work as part of Gang Green to improve our school grounds.

We are so lucky to have so many students who seek leadership opportunities and who are willing to give up their free time to make this school a better place.

SUPERVISION

The playground is supervised from 8.45am and children should not be at school before this time unless prearranged by a teacher or due to a school event. Each day teachers will be in their classroom at 8.55am and parents should note that lessons begin at 9am sharp. If you need to speak with your class teacher around more complex issues, please arrange an alternative mutually agreeable time after school.

If your child is ill at school, or suffers an accident, then staff will give immediate care and appropriate first aid. However, on occasions, it is necessary to contact parents and we are often frustrated by out of date information that delays this process.

Please make sure you notify the school Office of any changes to your contact details or those of your Emergency Contacts as well as mobile phone numbers for our SMS system. Obviously, in extreme cases we may also deem it necessary to call an ambulance before consulting parents and you need to be aware of this. Please also keep the Office informed of any change in medical issues faced by your children as this helps us to make the best choices for their welfare. Your up to date contact information is especially important for our SMS system in case we need to contact you in case of an emergency e.g. bushfire.





Day 4 Learning with nature!

Iggy, Zoe, Violet and Jo did NOT like the taste of parsley from the veggie garden.






