Grade 5/6 City Camp

On the 31st July and the 1st of August Grade 5/6 went on an adventure to the city. We stayed at the Discovery Melbourne and did many amazing things and learnt lots of interesting facts about our city.

We went to: Queen Victoria Market, MCG, Melbourne Sports Museum, Birrung Marr, Federation Square, China Town, Ice-skating at O'Brien Sports Arena, Parliament House, Melbourne Gaol.



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What We Are Learning In Grade 5/6!

This term we are focusing on Australian poetry and in particular, looking at the work of Banjo Patterson. We will be analysing poetry and creating our own narratives from poems. We will be:

sharing opinions about poems. examining text structures in poetry. examining and compared odes and anthems. writing our own school anthem. analysing and writing about Australian poetry.



Numeracy

Over the past few weeks students have been investigating number patterns. Students have been analysing and showing the structure of a pattern in different ways. They have also been investigating equations and how they represent a balance between two quantities on each side of the equal sign. Changing both sides the same way does not change this relationship.

Over the next four weeks students will be investigating fractions, decimals and percentages. We will begin with looking at equivalent fractions, improper fractions, mixed numerals and subtracting and adding fractions with different denominators.

Inquiry

The focus of inquiry in Term 3 is Economics. Students are very excited about the prospect of setting up a business with 3 other students, with the view to winning support from a "Patch Business Community Shark Tank" (who may meet student's requests for monetary support and / or mentoring to start the business off), and taking their idea further and running a stall at the PatchFest in October. Only one group from each grade will win the opportunity to take their idea to the PatchFest. Other students will then back these three businesses and support them in producing their product, advertising and running the stall.

All students will learn how to form a partnership, create a business plan, budget, develop ideas and prototypes, and pitch their ideas to the "Shark Tank." All students will have the chance to win one of several business awards.

The rules of the project are:

1. You will form a business with three other students.

2. Your business is to run a stall.

3. Your market / Patch Festival stall is to be held at school on Saturday 27th October, 2018. At this stall you must sell a good or service that you have designed yourselves.

4. Each business will complete a business plan. (This will be done as group work in class.)

5. The business plan is to be presented to a panel of three judges. If the plan is successful, the business may receive an agreed amount to cover costs.

6. Your aim is to run the most successful business. Awards will be presented in the following categories:

} Most money raised for the school

} Most innovative product / idea developed

} Best presented business plan

} Best run marketing/advertising campaign

} Sustainable ideas.
