Digital Technology

Inquiry

The focus of inquiry this term is creativity through design and technologies. Students are very excited about designing and constructing arcade games from recyclable materials for this year's Patchfest.

Grade 5/6 were inspired by a short film titled Caine's arcade. It featured a cardboard arcade created by then 12-year-old Caine Monroy out of boxes and everyday objects. The boy ran his arcade from his father's auto parts store in East Los Angeles during mid-2011. This amazing story shows just how important it is to let children create and design things of interest to them and is surely to leave you amazed at the learning that took place in his project. At our Patchfest arcade, students will apply design and systems thinking and design processes to investigate ideas, generate and refine ideas, plan and manage, produce and evaluate designed solutions.

Before they can begin construction, students must:

Brainstorm, plan, measure designs both on paper and in Minecraft Education.

Think about the rules of the game and be able to explain them.

Have some thoughtful, complicated build elements in the game.

Have a game that is a complicated build, but an easy, fun experience for the players.

Test it and revise it again.





Numeracy

This term our focus is on fractions. We have started by looking at fractions on a number line, equivalent fractions, improper fractions, simplifying fractions, and then working towards adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing fractions. We are also exploring strategies involved in problem solving, particularly where the problem is expressed in words.

Once again we stress that it is important that students are regularly practising their times table. We ask that you encourage your children at home to do this on a con-

Japanese

The 5/6s are just about finished their immersion unit on Edo Japan, a period in Japanese history 1603-1868, and comparing and contrasting it to gold rush era Victoria. There were many similarities between the two countries at the time, with the working class protesting and rising up against the government due to unfair taxes. Our focus on history will continue, with the students soon beginning to write daily routines in Japanese about their time at camp at Sovereign Hill.



Standing Tall

The Standing Tall program continues this Term with Yale, and the program promotes self esteem, awareness, respect and cohesion through a martial arts perspective. The

basis of the program is to use physical exercise to engage students, and constantly link these with mental and social skills. Throughout the program, students become more aware of who they are and how they can promote positive interactions with others.

The program is designed to prepare students for challenges they may face in their transition to high school. It focusses on empowering both the group and the individual to combat schoolyard bullying, with personal safety being the highest priority.

Some of the topics include: mental strength, body language, valuing diversity, following intuition and goal setting. Basic self defence skills are taught to provide students with the tools they may need if boundaries are crossed. Boys and Girls groups are run separately to promote a non-threatening environment where students can develop a new skill set while exploring their identity and relationships with others.

Interschool Sports




Cross Country

HOMEWORK

In Grade 5/6 we encourage students to be reading **every day** in order to continue developing a life-long habit. This could include independent reading/ reading to someone such as a parent or younger sibling/co-reading with a parent or parent reading to the student.

Our expectation for homework for Grade 5/6 students on a weekly basis is:

- Student diaries to be filled in with evidence of reading at least 4 times during the week this includes the title and number of pages read.
- Maths tasks assigned by the teacher, which could include a worksheet or Mathletics tasks.
- Spelling activities including: Look, say, cover, write check, Thrass, writing words in sentences.
- Reading Circle preparation if not completed in class.

Homework is expected to be completed independently by students but supported by parents. Homework will be assigned on a **Tuesday** and returned the following **Monday** to be checked.

Students who DO NOT complete their homework 3 times in a term will have to attend Marmook for on 3 occasions to complete the assigned homework.
