

# What We Are Learning In Grade 5/6!

### Literacy

In reading we have been working on building our reading stamina, understanding the readers' workshop and monitoring comprehension. Our reading strategies include making deep connections to what we read through our own lives, books we've read, films we've seen or songs we have heard. We are looking at how these connections help us both remember and understand what we are reading. We are also learning to pay attention and think about the words and ideas in the text and carry on an inner conversation in our heads and later jot down our thoughts. Over the next few weeks we will begin reading circles and learn about the process and roles involved in effective book discussions.





This term in writing our focus is on narratives. We are working on understanding the writing process particularly the pre-writing and drafting stage. We are focusing on collecting ideas in our writer's notebooks , developing detailed plans before we write and structuring and sequencing our

work correctly for our audience.

In spelling students are continuing to work on Thrassing our words. We are investigating homophones and prefixes such as im/in/dis/de.

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#### Japanese

This term in Japanese students are revising hiragana, the Japanese alphabet. Students are completing an assortment of activities with the alphabet such as recognition, handwriting, and similar sounds. Students are then playing a variety of games to reinforce the hiragana. This is an excellent grounding before we move onto more complex language later in the year. If you would like to, here is a link to print and practise hiragana flashcards at home.

#### Numeracy

Over the past 2 weeks on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays students have been exploring place value, prime numbers and factors. We have been investigating decimal place value and using decimals to add, subtract and multiply. On Thursdays students have been involved in reading timetables, and telling the time both on an analogue clock and in 24 hour time.

For the rest of the term students are exploring the 4 operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. They will be looking at the properties of 2D and 3D shapes and investigating angles.

At Grade 5/6 level it's important that students are regularly practising their times table. We ask that you encourage your kids at home to do this on a consistent basis.



This term Grade 5/6 students are reading the Australian story 'Storm Boy' by Colin Thiele.

When Storm Boy goes walking along the beach or over the sandhills, or in the sanctuary the birds are not afraid. They know he is a friend. He lives with his father, Hideway Tom in a humpy made of brush and wood. One day a group of young pelicans decide to come to visit Storm Boy and Hideaway. With their friend Fingerbone they name them Mr Proud, Mr Ponder and Mr Percival.
When two of them leave, Mr Percival stays to live with them and Storm Boy and the pelican become best friends. In return Mr Percival helps to rescue a shipwrecked fishing crew.

This moving story became a magical film and is now one of the classics of Australian writing for children. Make sure you ask your kids about it!

### HOMEWORK

In Grade 5/6 we encourage students to be reading **every day** in order to continue developing a life-long habit. This could include independent reading/ reading to someone such as a parent or younger sibling/co-reading with a parent or parent reading to the student.

Our expectation for homework for Grade 5/6 students on a weekly basis is:

- Student diaries to be filled in with evidence of reading at least 4 times during the week this includes the title and number of pages read.
- Maths tasks assigned by the teacher.
- Spelling activities including: Look, say, cover, write check, Thrass, writing words in sentences.
- Reading Circle preparation if not completed in class.

Homework is expected to be completed independently by students but supported by parents. Homework will be assigned on a **Tuesday** and returned the following **Monday** to be checked. Students who DO NOT complete their homework 3 times in a term will have to attend Marmook for half of break 2 on 3 occasions to complete the assigned homework.
